
Snake Facts



- Snakes come in many colors and sizes.
- Some can act like a rattlesnake when it feels threatened.

- If, you do get bitten, do not restrict the blood flow, just remain calm, and get medical attention immediately.

- Coral Snake, poisonous, is confused with the king snake.



- Northern Mojave Rattlesnake, comes in a few colors. Sand to olive green Which we commonly know as the Mojave Green. This snake is very poisonous, because its venom is a neurotoxin. This venom acts on the central nervous system as well as the flesh and fluids. A bite from this snake gives you a flight in a chopper to the hospital.



- Sidewinder Rattlesnake, this snake travels sideways. It is poisonous.



- Diamondback Rattlesnake, lives almost all over the U.S.. It is poisonous, but not as poisonous as the Mojave Green.



- Gopher snake, non-poisonous. He will bite, but you will be fine.



- Redracer Snake, non-poisonous. He will bite, and his bite will tear your flesh off.



- Rosy Boa Snake, non-poisonous.



- California Kingsnake, non-poisonous. This guy looks similar to the Coral Snake.
